# AAUW Branch Meeting Minutes Mountainside Methodist Church Hot Springs Village-January 16, 2013

The meeting was called to order by
President Becky Gifford at 10:25 a.m. with
34 members present. Guests included
Leslie Johnson, Myra Sanders, Sissi
Trabant, Suzette Watson, Katherine
Winslow, Mary Erdman, Peggy McCoy,
Ruth Marlin, Sue Tanner, speaker Anais
Troadec and new member Karen Muth.

#### Announcements:

- The AAUW Annual meeting will be held in New Orleans on June 9-13.
   Early registration deadline is February 4. Becky urged us to consider attending. Linney Roher is going.
- The book sale is October 11-12 with a planning meeting on February 11 at 1:30 at UUVC with all invited. It is hoped that someone will volunteer to be overall chair by or before that meeting.
- Sorting will start in March. The schedule is in the Hot Sheet.
- Karen Vinyard announced that today is the last day to order name tags before summer and asked who might have the one for Pat Poole, which is missing.
- Chris Cash thanked the group for the many children's books. Three boxes were delivered to the school near Jasper and were much appreciated.
- Meg Koziar thanked the group for their many expressions of sympathy.

Treasurer Barbara Larson reported that the balance in the General Fund balance is \$2567 and in the Book Sale Fund \$12,099 after the donation of \$2000 to AAUW Opportunity Fund, and \$250 to UUVillage Church for rental.

The February meeting will be at the DeSoto Club, with a program for Black History month, and in March at Diamond D's, with Mary Erdman as speaker.

Mary Jane Attwood presented our speaker, Anais Troadec, who recently returned from Guinea in Africa for WinRock International. She was dressed in clothing from that country and had brought with her a number of artifacts from employment with USAID and the UN. She told us of her work in Africa in organizational development for Food Security with groups of women and men who were illiterate, and how she dealt with the challenges of getting a message across.

Among her stories was one of going to a school with a crowd of young children following her. Upon arriving, she asked the teacher of a class of 60 or so children why these other children were not inschool and was told it was because they had no benches for them. "Would you take these children if there were benches?" she asked. Upon receiving an affirmative answer, she went to the carpenter and ordered three at a cost of \$9 each. Perhaps we could donate for more benches, she suggested.

(Funds could be sent to the Little Rock office of WinRock for forwarding to Guinea.)

She answered questions about FGM - 90+% of the girls in Guinea are mutilated so they will be marriageable; about trafficking of women and children – there is more money made in trafficking them than in trafficking drugs; and about Mali. She explained the geopolitical situation in Mali, with former al Qaeda supporters of Kadafi returning and France trying to combat them, with some American suppot.

The meeting was over at 11:30.

Meg Koziar, Acting Secretary
