This school term we have awarded \$21,000.00 to fifteen deserving women. The Scholarship Committee thanks all who attended the luncheon, helped with the book sale, and made contributions to the AAUW Funds this past year.

AAUW in Guinea West Africa ~Anais Troadec ~

These wonderful pictures show village life In Guinea, West Africa. Under Winrock International, I volunteered to help in the organizational development of 26 rice producing and bee keeping cooperatives in a small village of Nialya, (1050 inhabitants), about 13 hours out of the capital Conakry. These coops wanted to start a union in order to have access to more information on how to better produce and market their products. The representation by women came from very small cooperatives in garden produce, chickens and eggs. Some women coops also raised lambs for the Muslim holy days. They shared in the coops profits and worked communally.

Being a Muslim polygamous community, most men have 2-3 wives. The job of raising and feeding many children is shared by the co wives. Girls work in the household beginning at the age of 5. The girls, who are lucky enough to go to school for the first three years, attend class around work hours (fetching water, fetching firewood, and feeding the chickens) which does not afford them time for homework. The costs of a uniform, school supplies and loss of help for the mother are constraints to sending girls to school.

The school director said that there were not enough benches for more children (girls) to attend school. That is what the HSVAAUW made happen.

With the help of the Village Chief, who chose the recipients based on his criteria, your generous gift of \$1,427 was used to make 70 benches carved with the AAUW and 100 uniforms –fifty girls, fifty boys, all with an insignia of the old AAUW logo. (Please see photos) Many of those benches will seat girls for the first time- with their uniform proudly showing the AAUW logo. Boy's uniforms are two- piece in khakishirt and short pants and girls uniforms are a pink striped sheath dress.



The principal gave to 100 first-, second- and third graders the essential opening day school supplies, i.e., small chalk board and chalk for first graders to help them learn their letters, others, pencil, paper, erasers, folders etc.. There are around 340 children in six grades.

Since four teachers did not have a chair to sit on in the classroom, AAUW funds paid for four teachers chairs also. (See photo). The school principal, teachers, village Chief, mayor and Prefect of the sub-district and other dignitaries attended the ceremony giving the uniforms and awarding the benches to the school. It was a proud day for Nialya.

There exist many other needs for this school. New blackboards are especially needed along with supplies for the older grades in science. Sports equipment, (a few soccer balls, some shoes, a basketball hoop). Nialya has a rather successful adult soccer team and has won many times against its closest villages!

We made sure that everyone knows that AAUW will be having its 20th book sale later this year. In addition, we will continue to explore additional types of fundraising opportunities.
